#### FREE Grinling Gibbons - UK Trip Report—JAN 11, 7:00 PM Click here to register

JAN Chuck Rinehart travelled to the UK on an eight day trip organized by Mary May to view the stunning carvings by arguably the world's best carver. Chuck is a talented photographer and will share some of the jaw-dropping works they viewed and enlighten us with some of the history and background of these works, produced circa 1700.

These 300 year old carvings have been through WW II bombings, fires and relocations, and restorations, but the Limewood Gibbons carved has endured these hardships.

Gibbon's "life-like" style of imaging flowers, vegetables, plants, seafood, animals, game, musical instruments, crowns, jewels, lace, fabrics, ribbons, even musical notes on sheet music, were influenced by his early years in the Netherlands where highly detailed, life-like images of flowers in vivid colors were the subject of fine-art paintings. So different from the classical Oak Gothic forms, the norm in England in the 1600s.

Kelley Stadelman is a notable carving professional and teacher, extending back to the 1990s. She is famous for her Santa and related figures, but she has also created monumental works, including a five-foot crucifix for her church in North Plains. This program features slides, videos and Q&A of how she conceived, modeled, carved, and painted this 18 month project. She may also describe how she created another large statue 15 years earlier. Her process is a model for creating large projects.

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# Advanced Mack Sutter Relief Carving Class — online & hybrid

Saturdays Jan 8, 15, 22, 9:30-12:00

Taught by Larry Wade, two separate classes, Saturday session, click here, Thursday session, click here

This class carves the fourth of the 12 projects originally taught by Mack Sutter for forty years. Tuition is free, but an optional and free-will donation to the club is requested upon completion. Material costs will be about \$25 for a hardwood blank and a pre-sawn Basswood appliqué for practice. There will be a shipping charge if you don't pick up wood or tools near Beaverton. This workshop will be taught online with Zoom, and two in-person students might be possible depending on the state of the pandemic.



# Incised Carving Class (free) — online & hybrid one Saturday 1:30-4:00 PM, repeated monthly

Click on a date to register for one session Jan 15, Feb 19, Mar 19

This one-session, 2 1/2 hour class is for those new to carving or those who want to try incised carving. The same class repeats each month.

Welcome

The incised style carves lines into the surface of wood and can be done safely with one tool. This workshop is for those who have never carved or for carvers who have no incised experience. If safe from the pandemic, the class might be available simultaneously online and in person (hybrid). You will be provided with free basswood, a loaner tool, patterns, and a carving mat.

Students will carve the Dogs Welcome sign shown, then a second project will be at least started. Students will use a parting (V) tool, and will be shown how an Xacto knife or equivalent can also be used.

# Stropping for Beginners (free) — in-person only

Taught by Roger Crooks. Click a date to register Dec 8, Jan 12, Feb 9, Interest List, Wednesdays, 9:30-noon

One of our main charters is to preserve the art of carving and to do so requires teaching beginners. We all know sharpening is critical. There are many articles and videos online, and they often show contradictory ways to sharpen. For a beginner with few tools, figuring out how to start sharpening is daunting.

Our philosophy is to start with good tools and keep them sharp with stropping. Reshaping tools, power sharpening, and using stones will be future classes. This beginner's class will be hands-on, as there is a fine line between getting a sharp edge and rolling over the edge making the tool duller. Correcting your technique in real time will start you on the right path to building muscle memory for sharpening. The class repeats monthly, currently on Wednesday mornings.



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




#### By Jim Spitzer

Regular newsletter readers know that I enjoy unexpectedly stopping in my tracks to admire carvings encountered during walks and travels. A postcard from Monica Setziol-Phillips about an exhibit featuring wood carvings motivated a trip to the Oregon Coast to see the exhibit, and enjoy a few days of salt air, wind-driven spindrift, and stormy seas. For nine years Monica has led carving workshops at the Sitka Center for Art and Ecology. Located on Cascade Head just north of Lincoln City and the Salmon River estuary, the center offers over 100 one to four-day intensive courses in a number of arts on a campus located on a magical, heavily forested hillside.

The Journeys with Wood exhibit was at the Chessman Gallery inside the Lincoln City Cultural Center this past October into early November. It featured mostly abstract and some symbolic carvings by Monica and seven of her Sitka students. The Guild presented a January 2021 program online on Monica's father Leroy Setziol and features him as a Notable Carver.

However, aside from a piece by Monica on pages 6-8 of the February Newsletter on the <u>Doors at Nordia House</u>, we have yet to do justice to her extensive body of work that expands on her father's style. A fairly common element of the Setziol style is cutting grids into the wood to separate patterns and elements. This article further honors Monica's work and her influence on others. It features my favorite of the several pieces that each student exhibited, a few words about them, and more on Monica and her work.

Monica started her career as a weaver and gradually began to combine her weaving with wood carving, striving to get each medium to relate to the other. She sees this approach as the completion of a circle; she builds a work of fabric through the addition of warp to weft, subtracts material in carving wood, and precariously puts them together in the hope that they clearly belong together. I think you will agree that the above and below pieces do that well.

In 'It Takes a Village,' Monica melds cheerfully bright wool tapestry with bold shapes and textures carved in Alaska Yellow Cedar. We have all heard this in the context of raising a child. Monica notes that it carries into creating a cohesive society that can sustain the arts, culture, and so many other elements of community.

'Landscape' is more subject to one's interpretation. I see a long, lonesome byway. The stepped perimeter and vivid blues and greens make the work visually pop. I don't know what to make of the square shape with a peak; I can't help but visualize the back pocket of a pair of jeans.

In this untitled carving on Alaska Yellow Cedar, Jeff Lorence combines many patterns, shapes, and textures. Jeff has worked with wood for most of his life, first under his Dad's wing, and then built a career in historical and period architecture.

'Fall Where They May' on Alder is an example of Jim Gryte's preference to let the beauty of the wood inform the work. Jim has loved working in wood ever since carving a 7-inch long kayak in his grandfather's garage as a boy. He sees the meditative process of carving as a foil to the stresses of life and his profession in health care.

In this untitled piece on mahogany, Edward Running strives for a dialog between the material and the explorer to tell a successful story. Almost all of the segments are uneven four-sided rectangles of various elevations with the uneven perimeter adding visual interest.

I needed to see the title to fully discern how Whitney Vogel's 'Cosmic Goose' in Black Walnut took full advantage of the grain and coloration of the wood to inform the design and title. It's as if the diving bird were silhouetted against the orb of a planet or moon with a star overhead and hills below. Whit is a craftsperson by trade, art director for film and television by day, and wood carver on any break and sometimes at night. He notes that Monica not only weaves fabric and carves wood, she also weaves poetry into the lessons.

Ian Gelbrich got to know Monica through the public arts commission process. He comes from a timber family and was raised along various coastlines of the Pacific Northwest. As an architect and photographer he felt a step removed from the process of making and appreciates the meditative qualities of carving.

Film maker and musician Matt Ritter grew up in a creative environment and found wood carving as a relatively recent creative outlet. I am amazed that this mahogany piece is untitled as it speaks so loudly to me as a naturalist and environmentalist at heart. Do you see what I see in this work?

Hilary Pfeifer's 'MUN' is crafted of reclaimed hardwoods. She is a sculptor who took Monica's class in order to explore how carved elements can add one more subtle element to her art. Many of us who work in wood might find freestanding works and mobiles to be excellent creative uses for scraps and offcuts that have been destined for the burn pile.
